MSI Network in the North

Seashell organises Intervenor network sessions every year. The day is based around free training and networking for Intervenor staff. It started with support from NatSIP and Sense but is now a feature of Seashell's commitment to staff development. The training topics are suggested by Intervenor staff and the specialist trainers offer their services free of charge.

Sessions are well attended, and in order to make it possible for more people to attend, two centres are involved now: one group in Bradford, in conjunction with the North Teachers Network, and one in the west at Seashell in Cheadle Hulme.

Meeting at the end of the school day is a very big ask for both participants and the trainer.

The networking participants now include Intervenor staff, staff working with MSI students and colleagues from sensory services.

This Network work was established to support the professional development and status of the specialist support staff, working one-to-one with deafblind/MSI children and young people.

In the mid 1990's Government funding was provided to encourage models of good practice to support the highly individual needs of deafblind children in educational settings.

Since that time the number of Intervenor staff has grown and a training course is accredited and established in many areas of England and Wales.

Network days, held on Saturdays, have been a very important feature of the group and its "glue" is its Facebook page, which is members only, and provides a welcome place to exchange ideas and information with others doing the role.

At the Victoria MSI Unit, pupils follow a specialist curriculum to help them learn to understand and interact with people and the world around them. It has very high levels of staffing - 1:1 for many activities - and of expertise, with ongoing specialist training for all staff.

The specialist curriculum was developed at Victoria to meet the complex needs of pupils with MSI. It was published in 2009 by Sense, and is now used in other settings and services for children with MSI in the UK and round the world. A “Toolkit” is also available to assist those wishing to start using it.

Victoria is an *Ofsted* rated Outstanding school.
